


The European Ageing Network, gathering in EUROPEAN Utrecht on 12 April in Utrecht, has elected a AGEING NETWORK new Board.

With no disease-modifying treatment currently available and varied access to diagnosis, treatment and high quality care across Member States, EU institutions must show leadership by making dementia a priority in the fields of health, research and innovation, and social affairs, says Alzheimer Europe. Candidates can choose several options to show their support. A first option is to support the campaign via social media (Twitter and Facebook), simply using the hashtag #DementiaPledge2019. Secondly, they can sign the Pledge document and return it to Alzheimer Europe, or to the national member association in their country. Around 9.1 million people in Europe have dementia and these numbers are expected to increase to 14 million people by 2040, due to the ageing of European societies. The Pledge is currently available in nine languages: Croatian, English, French, German, Italian, Luxembourgish, Polish, Slovenian and Spanish. 





EAN is registered in Luxembourg, has its Secretariat in Prague and a branch office in Brussels.









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
